Vestal man puts together anti-war Song Video

Where do
the best song
videos come
from these
days? Hollywood? NYC?
How about
Broome County?

Welcome to the modern digital video era. Fancy effects that once required expen-



sive equipment and professional expertise can now be created with desktop computers and editing software, and at least one local resident is making use of those tools. Not so long ago, Broome County resident Dave Elder put together a video for an original song called "If I Was You" that he humbly — or perhaps not so humbly — calls "The 2nd-best Anti-war Song Video of All Time."

Of course, Dave doesn't expect anyone to just take his word for it — he'd like people to watch "If I Was You" and make up their own minds. Viewing the YouTube video doesn't cost any money, and from start to finish will only take about 3 minutes of the viewer's time.

"I'm not trying to tell you what to think," says Elder, slyly referencing the chorus line of his song. "If you've seen better anti-war song videos, I'd sincerely like to hear about them. Feel free to post a comment on my Facebook music page (Dave Elder) or send me an email (link information at Dave's website daveelder.com)."

So what kind of impressive special effects show up in this video? In a scene he calls "The Charge of the Lightstring Brigade" a group of 15 Daves scramble out of a trench, each one holding the same Black Fender guitar. In a similar segment, a group of marching Daves form a Fender firing squad with instruments aimed straight at the viewer. Elder had these and most of the other sequences filmed at his Vestal location, but for the section where he stands by a brick wall next to changing Uncle Sam posters, he did have to drive over to the parking lot next to the Endicott DMV. However, those Uncle Sam posters that he reacts to in the video, while looking quite realistic, did not actually hang from that brick wall — they magically appeared through the sorcery of modern desktop video editing.

Dave had to go a bit further to find the gas pump that shows up in verse 3 — that required a side trip along Route 267 a bit south of the PA border, but Elder felt the resulting image justified the trip, though he invites viewers to judge for themselves.

Where did he find the military vehicles that show up in the video? While in a couple of places they seem to move, they all come from a series of stills Dave took with his old 35 mm camera of props parked next to Madison Square Park in Manhattan for use in the 1998 version of "Godzilla" and they look a lot more impressive on film than they did in real life. Standing next to them, he thought they looked like obvious fakes made of cheap painted plywood, so it surprised him how believable those counterfeits came across in the finished prints, but that very quality made them ideal for his project. Elder also added to the mix a handful of other photos from his collection that he snapped at demonstrations in NYC, D.C. and Texas.


